The Agrifood Innovation Institute (AFII) recently hosted a visit to ANU by Australia's Chief Scientist <u>Cathy Foley</u>.



While on campus, Dr Foley was joined by Provost Rebekah Brown and Pro-Vice Chancellor, Research Initiatives and Infrastructure, Ute Roessner for presentations by ANU researchers. The presentations covered initiatives that harness the interdisciplinary expertise and infrastructure of the University and our partners to address community and industry needs in agrifood, climate and space governance.



Dr Foley toured Australian Plant Phenomics Network and Plant Synbio NCRIS facilities, meeting staff and students from AFII and the ARC Training Centre for Future Crops Development.

She spoke about the importance of <u>Australia's</u> <u>National Science and Research Priorities</u> in guiding the work we do to promote the best outcomes for the community, and about promoting multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary thinking among HASS and STEM researchers. She also discussed how researchers can make a greater impact by effectively communicating their research outcomes.



While Dr Foley will end her term as Chief Scientist at the end of this year, we are grateful for her insights and engagement and look forward to continuing to support researchers across campus to work together to deliver innovative research and development with a real-world impact.
